Government grants were 53% of revenue and the thrift store 16%. Program services (the shelter, the helpline and advocacy, legal advocacy, the children's program and housing assistance) were 81% of expenses; with the store's own costs, which exist to fund those programs, 89%.

PART VII · COMPENSATION (SAMPLE)

Fourteen staff: an executive director, a shelter manager, four shelter advocates, two helpline advocates, a legal advocate, a housing advocate, a children's program coordinator, a volunteer and training coordinator, a thrift store manager and a finance and office manager. The nine board members are volunteers and receive nothing. Names are omitted from this sample because every person connected with this organization is invented.

Part III · Program service accomplishments — sample for fiscal 2025

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MISSION

Safety, shelter and advocacy for people experiencing domestic violence in one county of the Willamette Valley, at any hour, whether or not they are leaving, with every service beginning on a confidential helpline.

PROGRAM 1 · THE SHELTER

A confidential emergency shelter of 24 beds. In fiscal 2025 it provided 6,840 bed-nights to 186 adults and children, counted from the shelter log, which keeps no names past a stay. The address is not published in any document, including this one.

PROGRAM 2 · THE HELPLINE, SAFETY PLANNING AND ADVOCACY

4,120 calls answered, each logged with time and length and never with a name; safety planning by phone and in person; Spanish-language advocacy; 41 households helped into housing with deposits and first month's rent paid directly to landlords.

PROGRAM 3 · LEGAL ADVOCACY

Help preparing 212 Family Abuse Prevention Act petitions and accompaniment to court. The organization counts help given, not orders granted, and its advocates give no legal advice.

PROGRAM 4 · GROUPS AND THE CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

290 support-group sessions across six weekly groups, one in Spanish, with attendance never counted by name; a children's room and coordinator in the shelter.

PUBLIC DISCLOSURE

The three most recent returns and the exemption letter are published on the organization's website and available on request. The organization reports the rule; it does not advise on it.
